

# Saturday Morning Concerts at St Peter's

We are delighted to welcome a return visit of brilliant pianist Jill Crossland on 7th September. Jill studied at Chetham's School of music, and at the Royal Northern College of music in Manchester, before continuing her studies in Vienna, with Paul Badura-Skoda. She records on the Hyperion label and has performed in many of the country's most prestigious venues, such as the Wigmore Hall.

One of our Saturday favourites, Matt Lam (piano) returns on 5th October, partnered by cellist Jobine Siekman, described by BBC Music Magazine as a 'Rising Star' artist. She has performed as a concerto soloist with the famous Simon Bolivar Orchestra. They will perform the Cello Sonata No.2 by Brahms, together with other works for cello and piano.

As usual, admission is £7 (free for under 18s), which includes refreshments served from 10:30 am. Disabled parking is available in the church grounds and parking is available in the school yard on Rawcliffe Street. Concerts usually last for an hour.

## **School News**



In the Summer Term we focus on health and wellbeing; we think about our physical and mental wellbeing, keeping safe and growing and changing. We hold our annual healthy week, where the children take part in range of physical activities and learn about keeping healthy. The whole school took part in Sports Day and laser tag sessions.

Key Stage I children participated in Animal Olympics and Key Stage 2

had a great time getting wet and mucky during their 'Mini Mudder' challenge. A fun time was had by all!

Each class was given a different theme to deliver in healthy week. Our corridor displays will then be based on what it means to be healthy, which is far more than a balanced diet is.





EYFS looked at oral hygiene, Year I exercise, Year 2 protective clothing for hot/cold weather, year 3 thought about a balanced diet and hydration, Year 4 looked at the importance of talking about how we feel, year 5 thought about rest and sleep and Year 6 promoted reducing sitting and screen time.

The children participated in canoeing, caving, trapeze, piranha pool (problem solving), zip wire, climbing, crate stack, dungeon (problem solving), archery, nightline, giant swing, quest (problem solving), raft building and team challenge. It was amazing!!! A huge thank you to all the children for their participation.

Summayah said 'I enjoyed all of the activities. The instructors were supportive and kind and the food was amazing!' Blake said 'being away from home was hard but doing the activities with friends made it easier'. Hamnah said the 'residential was fun because we got to do rafting, trapeze and zip lining, which were great'. Lexi said the 'residential was so fun. We had to climb 5 metres up a rock wall'. Amaya said 'It was great fun, my favourite part was the giant swing because it went really high and fast'. Special prayers to Ava, Ruby and Ky as they start school, to Amelia-Rose going to High School and Isabelle and Reece going to college.



# A New Opportunity to Learn About Pastoral Care

"Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our troubles, so that WE can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves receive from God." (2Cor 1:3-4)

- Do you offer any sort of care for others within the Church? Or within the Community?
- Or maybe you've thought that God might be calling you to reach out to those who need a friend?
- Are you feeling that you'd like to find out more about Pastoral Care?
- Would you like some help and guidance in how to come alongside those who need comforting?

# If you can answer YES to any of the above questions, then you need to keep reading!

This Autumn, starting on 25th September, there's going to be a course taking place on **Wednesdays at Colne**, running for 7 weeks. Every week there will be Lunch at midday followed by 2 hours of Study, finishing at 2:45. It's aimed at people who'd like to study locally and is intended to be accessible to a wide range of people.

There's no cost, and no-one is committed to taking things further. The course qualifies as an Authorised Lay Ministry Elective. It's a good way to learn more about Pastoral Care aswell as an opportunity meet new people from local Churches.

I wonder what the word grounded means to you? If you are a teenager living in today's world, it probably means that you are in trouble and have to stay at home for a number of days or weeks. (Possibly without tv or a mobile phone if it is a really serious demeanour) Grounded could mean that you have your feet firmly on the ground and that you stand on the firm foundation of God's word. The same word but with vastly different meanings.

Recently I was reminded of Caleb. He is only mentioned briefly in the early books of the Old Testament. I vaguely remembered his name from Sunday school stories. 
