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


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

# From the Rectory

## A Season of Harvest and Hope

Dear friends,

As September arrives, the days subtly shorten, the air takes on a new, fresh edge, and our gardens, fields, and hedgerows offer up their fruits with quiet generosity. There is a gentleness to autumn's approach, yet beneath its golden surface lies an invitation: to reflect, to give thanks, and to prepare for all that is to come.

Harvest: Gathering Blessings

The month of September is, for many, associated with harvest. Perhaps you have noticed the combine harvesters in the fields. In the church calendar, we turn our thoughts and prayers towards Harvest Festival—a profound opportunity to express our gratitude for the earth's abundance and for those who labour to bring food to our tables.

But harvest is more than wheat and fruit. It is a reminder that, in every season of life, we are called to gather in the blessings that God has sown. Sometimes those blessings are obvious: a time of health, a new friendship, the birth of a child, or a grandchild. Sometimes, they are quieter or even bittersweet: finding courage in loss, resilience in hardship, or hope in a time of uncertainty.


There will be various displays, including the Book of St Peter, plus activities for children.

Our autumn series of concerts begins on 6th September when we welcome Ruth and James Sanderson (violin and piano). Ruth is a freelance violinist who frequently plays with the Hallé, BBC Philharmonic, and Royal Liverpool orchestras. James is a recital accompanist and has been a repetiteur for York Opera since 2015. Their programme includes Dvorak's Sonatina in G major and Grieg's Sonata in G major.

The concert begins at 11 am with refreshments served from 10:30 am. Admission is £7 (free for those aged 18 and under). Car parking is available in the schoolyard with disabled parking in the church grounds.



As part of the Heritage Day on the 20th of September, David Thornton will give an organ recital at 11:15 am. Admission is free for this concert, which follows on from the talk by Roger Frost.

David began his organ playing career taking lessons at St Peter's, before heading off to Lincoln Cathedral, where he became the first organ scholar. After a career in teaching, David passed the diploma examinations of the Royal College of Organists and holds the prestigious FRCO diploma. A trio of accomplished pianists complete the October and November concerts with Adam Davies from Chetham's School of Music on 4th October, Lewis Kingsley-Peart on 18th October and John Mark Rose on 1st November.

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## **Ladybirds: Tiny Heroes in Polka-Dot Armour**

The ladybird, with its stylish and cheerful polka-dot outfit, holds a special place in our hearts. Few other insects, apart from perhaps

the butterfly, evoke as many positive emotions and superstitions as the ladybird. Many cultures believe that ladybirds are a symbol of good luck and new beginnings. In fact, the belief that ladybirds are associated with positive qualities is nearly universal – from Slavic, European, and Asian cultures to Native Americans.

There are 46 different species of ladybirds in the UK and about 5,000 species worldwide. While some sport the classic red with black spots look, others come in shades of yellow, orange, or even black with red spots. All ladybirds are beetles and have a larval and adult form with the classic round and colourful ladybird being the adult whilst the larvae tend to be thin and black.

Many species of ladybird hatch from pupae in August or September so look out for a new generation of adults feeding up ready to overwinter. Ladybirds are voracious predators of aphids and other garden pests, serving as natural pest-control agents and helping to keep plants healthy. In fact, a single ladybird can devour up to 5,000 aphids and other plant-eating pests in its lifetime, making them invaluable allies to gardeners and farmers alike.

Despite their diminutive size, ladybirds are not without their challenges. Predators, parasites, and even rival ladybirds pose threats to their survival. Birds, spiders, and other insects prey on them. They do have defences against predators however, their bright red colour is a warning that they don't taste nice and when attacked they give off a yellow liquid which is rich in toxic alkaloids.

Churchyards and cemeteries can be great for ladybirds as they tend to be free of insecticides and full of food. There are lots of places where ladybirds can find a safe place to spend the winter, often in large clusters where they remain inactive until about March when they emerge to feed and breed. Monuments including chest tombs, gaps made by tree roots, wood piles, spaces beneath flaking bark, leaf litter, tussocky grass and drystone walls are full of potential places to overwinter.

With their rounded bodies and distinctive markings, ladybirds are easily recognisable. If you see a ladybird, take a photo or count its spots and make a note of both spot and background colours. The spot number indicates which species it is, not some people believe, how old it is.

We were shown round and I was given a little bundle of striped fur - I reached out and said 'Come on Frank' he fitted into the palm of my hand. Somehow I had acquired a dog. We got back into the car and I put him on the floor to get settled as I went to pick him up I realised he had pooped. At this point I should have realised this was a bad idea, but no for better or for worse this little dog was mine.

When we got back to Charis's house we were greeted by Thomas shouting 'here's Cutie'. I took the bull by the horns and said 'I was going to call him Cutie, but his Mummy told us his name is Frank.' Thomas looked at the dog and said 'OK Mummy is always right'. A smug look from my daughter. And

Frank, well he had done what dogs do and made a puddle on the rug.'

In sociology classes one is taught how to distinguish different types of people by their upbringing, race, beliefs living standards etc. and of course, financial means! It's relevant to our world. We usually group ourselves and relate to people of our own social status and who behave in a similar way that we are familiar with. It's our comfortable space! Some of you know that I am struggling trying to manage rheumatoid arthritis. I have found that eating non processed food, coupled with vitamins and massage, is helping considerably. Walking any distance is not feasible, so I go to a swimming pool to gently float and exercise my limbs. It's usually quiet and gives me time to pray. Two great therapies in one!

After my 'hydro therapy' one day I waited anxiously for the usually crowded bus. The driver stopped and I was gob smacked. The bus was as packed as any Venetian bus! Every seat was occupied and the standing room was

double the safety limit.! We were literally swaying until someone took pity on my white haired status, and gave up their seat. I soon realised that most of the passengers were a group of young people with learning difficulties on a day out to Burnley! They were aglow with



excitement laughter and chatter, with the exception of one or two who looked a little apprehensive. It was a memorable experience as they told me where they were going, what they had eaten for lunch and what they did at their drop-in centre. I was quite sorry when we reached the bus station, although I did have a dent in my side where I had been squashed against a pole by a very large young man!

This journey set me thinking of how we as Christians perceive things differently to those who do not believe in a God at all. What do we really believe about the Everlasting? I base my ideas on the biblical version of the risen Jesus as he encounters his disciples on the road to Emmaus. It was a while before the disciples recognised him. This leads us to believe that maybe Jesus did not look exactly the same. .

Yet we are told that we are made in God's image. Jesus was therefore a man and not a ghostly apparition. That very same day the disciples (only one was named as Cleopas) were so drawn to this knowledgeable, charismatic man, Jesus, that they asked him to stay with them that evening. They shared supper together and when Jesus broke the bread they recognised their friend as Jesus, the Risen Lord.

This set my mind pondering. When Jesus comes again will we recognise Him? We are told in various parts of the bible that He will come without warning! When Jesus returns with his choir of angels, We can join them in their song! All heaven declares the beauty of the Risen Lord! The Lamb that was slain sits on the throne, King and all Kings, forever and ever. AMEN.
